From the Town Manager, Jeaneen Clauss,...

Spring is here and Ponce Inlet has a lot to offer for those who enjoy being out in this beautiful weather. Not only does our community boast of its pristine view of the ocean and the intercoastal waterway but we offer trails and boardwalks to provide access to areas that would otherwise be far more difficult if not impossible for most to see. Ponce Inlet also proudly co-sponsors numerous events in the coming months – a Children’s Easter party, Corvette show, Turtle Release Day, Ice Cream Social, Flea Market,... We never stop in our efforts to improve your quality of life here in Ponce Inlet. As projects go, having completed the restroom improvements in the Kay & Ayers Davies Lighthouse Park (where you will now even find a dog fountain available for your thirsty canine companion) and with benches now ordered for the pavilion at this park, our primary project is building a boardwalk at Timucuan Oaks. However, we’ve also made some improvements that you may have noticed recently to make the dog park more enjoyable for you and your pet and we are planning other maintenance enhancements for this park the coming year.

The Town proudly co-sponsored the highly publicized and well-attended historic beach racing parade on February 16th – highlighting another aspect of the Town’s rich history. This parade traveled along the course of the original beach racing track, which began at the North Turn on South Atlantic Avenue to the South Turn / Beach Street, where it traveled onto the beach and headed back up to the North Turn. The Town in conjunction with Volusia County made facade improvements and marked these historic locations with are used as two beach access points last year. Monuments commemorating historic beach racing were put in place at that time, along with checkered flags and a checkered walkway.

Town Regular Election – 2013. Ponce Inlet’s election is scheduled to be held on Tuesday, August 13th. Three seats will be up for election on the Town Council this year. Seat 1 (Mayor), Seat 3, and Seat 5 will be open for two year terms. Qualified candidates must be a resident of the Town for at least twelve (12) months and a registered voter in Volusia County for six (6) months prior to qualifying period. Qualifying period will begin on Monday, June 3rd at noon and will end on Friday, June 7th at noon. Hurricane Season Is Only A Few Months Away

Make sure your information is up-to-date in our **CodeRED® Emergency Notification System**. The system will distribute emergency messages via telephone to targeted areas or the entire Town at a rate of 1,000 calls per minute. CodeRED® employs a one-of-a-kind Internet mapping capability for geographic targeting of calls, coupled with a high speed telephone calling system capable of delivering customized pre-recorded emergency messages directly to homes and businesses, live individuals and answering machines.

Ponce Inlet residents and businesses are welcome and encouraged to enter their contact infor-

mation for home, business, and mobile phones so they may be contacted by the system in the event of an emergency. It is important for town residents and businesses customers to register, especially if they use unlisted numbers, cell phones, or VOIP. Those who do not register their address and phone number may not be notified with CodeRED® in the case of an emergency. Registration is confidential, free, and easy.

Maintaining Integrity and Professionalism at Ponce Inlet Police Department



Did you know that the Ponce Inlet Police Department is one of the smallest agencies in Florida to receive accreditation? An accreditation program has long been recognized as a means of maintaining the highest standards of professionalism. The Ponce Inlet Police Department (PIPD) seeks to demonstrate a high level of performance, enhance and maintain the integrity of the department, and promote a high level of community confidence in its operations. Accreditation is a coveted award that symbolizes professionalism, excellence, and competence. PIPD is proud to be State Accredited through the Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation (C.F.A.).

As an accredited law enforcement agency, PIPD must adhere to standards set by the Commission for Florida Law Enforce-

ment Accreditation. Every three years the PIPD must provide proof of the department's compliance with the 257 standards established by the commission.

The standards address thirty-nine law enforcement categories. The major categories are:

- Organization, management, and administration
- Personnel structure
- Personnel processes
- Use of force
- Training
- Operations
- Operational support
- Traffic operations
- Communications and records
- Property and evidence

The standards set forth by Commission for Florida Law Enforcement Accreditation serve as a guide for the agency to strengthen its operations, improve service delivery, solidify interagency cooperation, and establish fair and nondiscriminatory personnel practices. Ultimately the standards improve the department's ability to boost

citizen and staff confidence in the agency.

Synthetic Drugs Receive Emergency Scheduling

The Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) has provided the following information addressing new psychoactive synthetic substances that are being marketed to Florida's youth. Likely produced as legal substitutes for ecstasy, cocaine and amphetamines, these chemicals are powerful stimulant drugs that have been designed to avoid legal prosecution and are commonly available on the internet, in specialty "smoke" shops, and in convenience stores. Like those pictured below, synthetic drugs can be comprised of different unregulated chemical substances and are being sold under a variety of names or brands.



Both the law enforcement community and medical professionals indicate that these substances are becoming increasingly popular due to the perception that they provide a seemingly safer alternative to illegal methods of getting “high” and that they can be easily obtained.

On December 11, 2012, Florida Attorney General Pam Bondi deemed synthetic drug chemicals to be a significant threat to health and public safety within the State of Florida. By delegation of authority granted under Chapter 893.035(7)(a), Attorney General Bondi placed these chemicals as emergency Schedule 1 drugs; their purchase, possession, sale, and/or distribution can result in a felony arrest.

Non-emergency Transport Program Update:



The Ponce Inlet Fire Department continues to transport non-emergency patients to the hospital.

To date, the fire department has transported over 60 patients, and all transports have occurred with **no** operational issues. The feedback from patients and our firefighters continues to be very positive. The most obvious benefit our patients continue to experience is getting to the hospital quicker with Ponce Inlet transporting. Another significant benefit that our patients now enjoy is what we call "continuity of patient care". This is where the EMT or paramedic that initiates patient care continues it throughout the entire transport process. This results in no loss or degradation in patient care information when they arrive at the hospital. Also, our staff knows the patient outcome at the receiving facility

and the results of the care we provide, which helps improve future patient encounters.

Dry Season Safety Reminders:

We are now in the height of the spring dry season. The spring of 2013 expects to be one of the driest on record. Even though we have received a small amount of rain over the past few weeks, this amount was far from what is really needed. We also had another warm winter for the area which continues to worsen the dry conditions. We ask that you remain vigilant whenever you are using open flames outdoor (cooking, decorative, etc.) as well as safely disposing of cigarettes (not outdoors). Al-

APARTMENT AND CONDOMINIUM FIRE SAFETY TIPS

Responsibility for the fire safety of your building lies with each and every resident. That's why it is so important that you plan together to keep your building as fire safe as possible and learn the right thing to do should fire break out. The first place to start is to learn the facts.

- Smoking is the #1 cause of all fatal apartment fires. And, nearly a third of them are caused by someone smoking in bed.
- Most residential fires occur at night when condos and apartments are most heavily populated.

Be Prepared! Plan Ahead for Everyone's Safety!

Meet with your landlord or building manager to devise fire safety plans for your building. As part of your group planning, explore your building. Know every possible exit, including exits from laundry, storage, and recreation rooms. If hallways

become smoky in a fire, your memory can help you find a way out. Remember never to use elevators in a fire. Keep exit and stairwell doors closed at all times, but not locked. And, keep exits clear of debris and storage. Focus on these four key elements in your fire safety plan: **prevention, detection, escape planning and practice, and fire department notification.**

Prevention

An ounce of prevention can save your life. Prevention is your best insurance against fire. Take these simple fire safety precautions in your own unit to prevent fire from starting.

Be careful with smoking materials. Keep large ashtrays for smokers and never smoke in bed!

Keep matches and lighters out of the reach of children. Store matches and lighters in a locked cabinet up high out of the reach of children.

Check regularly for electrical hazards, such as worn electrical cords, overloaded extension cords and outlets, and broken appliances.

Don't store flammable liquids in your home, car, or anywhere else inside your building.

Don't use balconies, porches, fire escapes or furnace rooms for storage. Fires starting in these areas can burn undetected.

Detection

Make sure the fire detection system works! If fire strikes, smoke detectors and fire alarms alert you to a fire right away, so you can get out of the building safely. Be sure your building has a working fire alarm system and learn to recognize the sound of the alarm. Know where the alarms are located in your building and how to operate them in an emergency.

Install smoke detectors on every

floor of your own unit. Be sure to place detectors on the ceiling near bedroom areas. This way, if a fire starts while you're asleep, detectors will wake you before it's too late.

If you notice that smoke detectors in your own unit or in public hallways are beeping, be sure to have their batteries changed or electrical systems checked. Replace dead batteries immediately.

Escape Planning and Practice

In a fire, there is no time to stop and think. You need to know in advance the two quickest safe ways out of your unit and your building. That is why it is critical that you make and practice escape plans.

Draw up floor plans for each floor with exits clearly marked.

Ask your building manager to post the floor plans in high-traffic areas, such as near elevators, exit doors, and foyers.

Make a point to review the floor plans now - because in a fire, smoky conditions and urgency can make this impossible.

Once you've mapped out evacuation procedures, decide on a meeting place outdoors. Go there as soon as you exit the building and stay there. This way, you can keep track of who is out and who may be trapped inside. If you think someone is trapped, tell the fire department - do not go back into the building yourself.

PRACTICE! Rehearse your escape plans as a group. Appoint a floor captain and hold a fire drill to make sure that everyone knows the right thing to do when the alarm sounds.

Fire Department Notification

Call 9-1-1! As a general rule, get out of the building, and then call the fire department from a safe place. When you call, be

ready to provide your locations and any other information about the fire.

What to Do If Fire Strikes

- Don't rush out of your apartment into the hallway. First, feel the door. If it is hot, use another way out. If the door is cool, leave by the nearest exit.
- If an announcement can be heard over your building's public address system, listen carefully and follow directions.
- Never use elevators in a fire! Use the stairs. Close all doors behind you to slow fire spread.
- If your planned escape route becomes smoky, get down on your hands and knees and crawl. Smoke rises, so the cleanest air is near the floor.
- Never go back into the building. Go directly to your planned meeting place and stay there. If you think someone is trapped inside, notify the fire department.
- If you can't escape your apartment, stuff wet towel, sheets, or clothes around the door and vents to keep smoke out.
- Call the fire department and tell them where you are. If no smoke is coming into the room you are in, open a window slightly both at the top and the bottom. Stay low and wave a bright cloth, towel, or sheet out the window to signal your location.

Remember, by accepting responsibility to keep your apartment or condo fire safe, you are not only protecting yourself, but your neighbors as well. A little bit of planning and awareness can make the difference between safety and disaster... for everyone!

Timucuan Oaks Project update

The first phase of improvements to Timucuan Oaks Gardens has begun. Core Construction Company of Jacksonville has begun the installation of the pilings for the boardwalk which will provide a leisurely stroll over the marsh to the waters of Daggett Creek. The boardwalk will include a covered gazebo over the marsh for wildlife viewing and canoe launch at the creek. Work is scheduled to be complete by June 2013. A more formal entrance to the park will be completed as the final phase later this year.

Volunteers Needed to Serve on Town Boards

The following list includes information on current vacancies and duties of various Town volunteer boards. If you are a registered voter living in the Town of Ponce Inlet, please consider serving on one of these boards.

Planning Board: 2 alternate seats. The Planning Board sits in both a quasi-judicial and legislative capacity, depending on the application before them. The

Board reviews applications for development plans, variances, special exceptions, rezoning, and amendments to the comprehensive plan. The Board also reviews ordinances and amendments to the Land Use and Development Code (LUDC). Further details on the Board's duties can be found in LUDC Section 6.2.2. Meetings are held at 5:30 p.m. on the fourth Tuesday.

Historic and Archaeological Preservation Advisory Board: 2 alternate seats. The Historic Board is responsible for review of applications and making recommendations to Town Council regarding historically significant properties. The Board is charged with nominating historic properties to the National Register of Historic Places. The Board also provides oversight to the Ponce Inlet Historical Museum. Further information on the board's duties can be found in Section 6.2.3 of the LUDC. The Historic Board meets on the first Thursday of the month at 10:00 a.m.

Parks, Recreation & Tree Advisory Board: 1 regular seat and 2 alternate seats. The Parks, Recreation and Tree Advisory Board is responsible for reviewing the removal of specimen trees over 12" DBH and making recommendations to Town Council regarding parks. Further information on this Board's duties can be found in Section 6.2.4 of the LUDC. Meetings are held on the first Monday of the month at 6:00 p.m.

If you are interested in volunteering to serve on this board, please contact the Code Enforcement Division at 236-2187 for an application or for more information. Alternate seat terms are valid for one year, and expire on December 31st.

Property maintenance: It is important that property owners periodically inspect, repair, and maintain all structures and vege-

tation located on your property. An inspection ensures the safety of your family, friends, guests, and neighbors and allows the owner to accurately assess maintenance issues. Please note that some maintenance and repairs may require a building permit.

With hurricane season quickly approaching, it is imperative that repairs be made in a swift manner, permits (if applicable) are obtained, and vegetation is trimmed and removed.

Certification accomplishment:
We congratulate Ms. Peg Hunt on her achievement of successfully obtaining Level II status with the FL Association of Code Enforcement. According to the UCF/Institute of Government, which teaches the FACE courses, Level II is rarely obtained on a student's first try. Ms. Peg Hunt has been the Town's Code Enforcement Officer since 2009.

Leaving Town?: If you are leaving town, we recommend that you turn off the water supply to your residence. This prevents any leaks from occurring within your property, and will avoid a high utility bill and costly repairs. If you contact the Utility Billing Department with this request, staff can also lock your meter to prevent meter tampering and theft. There may be a fee for this service. Contact 236-2151 for more information.

Staff News: In February John Peirce completed storm water level B class. Now almost all of the PW Department have storm water licensed. Congratulations to all.

Public Works conducted an all day in-house training class for all PW Technicians on safety, chainsaws, and road vegetation control. This information will be very helpful in their everyday work.

Public Works has started a project to upgrade water meters. As

time and the weather allows meters will be changed weekly until the project is completed, which we estimate will take 4 years.

The renovations at Davies Park restroom have been completed with new fixtures, hand dryers and a dog fountain.

Water Meter Access: Please keep your water meters clear of vegetation, vehicles, and other obstacles as this hinders meter readings and repairs. Ready access to your meter is a **must**. **Meters that need to be re-read due to blocked access are subject to additional fees.**

Solid Waste, Yard Waste & Recycling: Household trash (solid waste), Yard Waste, and Recycling services are provided

by Waste Management. If you have questions, they can be reached at 673-0800, x-331 during normal business hours. Please keep in mind that large piles or special pick-ups may be assessed additional fees. The regular schedule for pickups in the Town is: **Monday** and **Thursday** house hold trash, **Tuesday** recycling and yard trash, and **Wednesday** large piles of yard trash. Please make sure all items are to the curb before 7 am on the day of pick up.

Call Before You Dig: It is required by State law that you contact Sunshine State Locates at **1-800-432-4770** before doing any digging (hand or machine). This will prevent damage to buried cables, water lines, sewer lines, etc. and an unnecessary expense to you should you damage a utility.

Stormwater Maintenance:



Please keep trash and yard debris from entering into storm drains. If you see a plugged or blocked storm drain, please contact Public Works and provide the location so that staff can address the situation. Please remember to bag or containerize all loose yard waste such as grass, leaves and trimmings for pick up. This type of debris can plug the stormwater system resulting in poor drainage and

possible flooding.

Never pour anything into a storm drain. Our storm drains lead directly into the inter-coastal waterway and cause pollutants to enter the system (paint, gasoline, concrete, solvents, etc...). If you witness someone putting chemicals or any other material into a storm drain, notify Public Works or the Police Department immediately.

Fertilizers: If you must use fertilizers, only use low-phosphorus, slow release varieties.

There are educational materials regarding stormwater systems and water conservation available at the town hall and the Public Works facility. To learn more about Stormwater systems, please visit the St. John's River Water Management District (SJRWMD) at: www.sjrwmd.com.

The county landfill will be closed on Sundays.

Water Facts: Aboveground storage tanks ensure that water pressure is fairly constant and water volumes are sufficient to fight fires, even if the electricity that runs the water pumps is off.

Creature Feature

Spring is here, and that's when animal activity increases. This is my annual spring reminder of some creatures that share our home and ways we can live in harmony with them.

While driving, watch out for wildlife. Marsh rabbits feed on roadside grasses, and turtles cross the road in search of food, mates, or nesting sites. If you see a turtle crossing the road, please take the time to carry the turtle to the roadside in the direction it was heading.

Sea Turtle Nesting Season

Nesting season officially begins May 1, when our volunteers hit the beaches early each morning to patrol for nests. Nests are marked with protective boundaries and monitored daily. If you encounter a sea turtle, keep your distance, do not shine flashlights or use flash cameras, and enjoy the exciting experience. If you believe a sea turtle is in trouble, please call Beach Patrol at 386.239.6414 or after hours, the Sheriff at 386.248.1777 (press 1).

Last year was a record-breaking year with 919 sea turtle nests laid on Volusia County beaches. This excludes Canaveral National Seashore and North Peninsula Recreational area, which are managed by park staff. The previous highest year was in 2008 with 649 nests.

Remember that beachfront lighting rules apply during the nesting months of May through October. Beachfront lighting can deter females from nesting and causes the death and disorientation of hundreds of hatchlings each year.

Lights that are visible from or illuminate the beach should be shielded, replaced, or turned off. Motion detectors can be installed on security lights. Low profile, low wattage fixtures are ideal for pathways and decks. Move interior lights away from windows or use light-blocking window coverings or tint. Managed lighting saves electricity and, without the glare of excess lighting, allows great views of the ocean at night.

A new ordinance this year encourages beach users to remove all recreational equipment and furniture from the beach each night. These items are eyesores and hazards to people and wildlife. The law allows Volusia County to remove items that are left on the beach between 9 p.m. and 6 a.m.

The Marine Science Center is on Lighthouse Drive in Ponce Inlet. For only \$5.00, you can see marine exhibits and observe sea turtles and birds under rehabilitation. Hours are Tuesday through Saturday 10:00 to 4:00.

On April 6, Volusia/Flagler Turtle Patrol will hold its 6th Annual Turtle Fest in Flagler Beach at Veteran's Park (corner A1A and SR 100). Hours are 10:00 to 4:00 and the event is FREE. Please attend and contribute to our main fundraising event. You don't want to miss the giant tortoise race!

Ponce Inlet Animal Welfare

PAW is a nonprofit citizen's group that has been working since 2009 to humanely reduce the number of stray cats in Ponce Inlet through a trap-neuter-return program and cat colony.



Is this it? Cat colony member Kanga loves his food.

If you are feeding stray animals, your kindness is incomplete without ensuring that they are spayed or neutered to prevent unwanted animals and suffering. In fact, it is unlawful for any person to feed a feral or stray animal within the city except by owners or by officially designated cat colony caregivers.

Owners are required to spay/neuter their animals unless they qualify for an unaltered animal permit (for breeding or show animals). Citizens who feed stray cats are taking ownership

responsibility.

Citizens who feed homeless cats in Ponce Inlet and are able to trap them can take the cats to the Redinger Clinic at 600 North Mason Avenue, and PAW will cover the spay/neuter expense. The clinic is the least expensive in the area and has the newest and safest equipment. Since PAW was able to get a TNR policy approved in Ponce Inlet, the cat can be returned to their original habitat and they will no longer be able to reproduce.

Historic Preservation News

Davis House Historic Preservation, Inc. (DHHP) hosted a very exciting guest recently when the great, great nephew of William Aiken Walker, came to tour our historic treasures.

William Aiken Walker (1828-1921) was a self-taught, itinerant painter from Charleston, South Carolina, primarily known for his paintings of black sharecroppers and cotton plantations. Beginning in 1886 for about 20 years, he stayed at, and at times worked for, the Pacetti Boarding House in Ponce Park (Ponce Inlet). During this time, he painted beautiful seascapes, some featuring views of our be-

loved lighthouse.

Ponce Park was a popular fishing resort, and Walker would sell his paintings to the tourists or barter paintings for his rent. The tourists' catch would not be cooked until Walker had a chance to paint it.

Walker's great, great nephew Danny O'Driscoll also is an artist from Charleston and paints award-winning, lifelike pictures primarily of birds. During his visit, we toured the Ponce Inlet Lighthouse as well as the restored Meyer-Davis House,

which now houses the Ponce Inlet Museum, and the Hasty Cottage/Post Office.

We were joined by lighthouse staff, as well as Gladys and Earl Davis. Gladys was born at the lighthouse, and she and Earl have served on the lighthouse board since its inception.

Gladys lived for a time at the Morris Island Lighthouse in Folly Beach, South Carolina. O'Driscoll presented her with a print of his painting of the Morris Island Lighthouse and has plans to paint our dear Ponce
