This very special award has only been given three other times in the history of our Town. It is reserved for citizens with exceptional character dedicating a lifetime of service to the Town of Ponce Inlet.

While it's impolite to discuss a woman's age, Gladys Meyer Davis has lived in Ponce Inlet for 86

years. Born at the Ponce De Leon Inlet Light Station, her father was First Assistant Keeper Edward Meyer, who would later serve as the Lighthouse's last civilian Principal Keeper, the Coast Guard's first Chief of Station, and owner of Ponce Inlet's historic Meyer's Fish Camp.

Her volunteer service began while she lived on the grounds of the Lighthouse, helping her mother and father with the many duties of daily life on the Lighthouse grounds. As a founding member of the Ponce De Leon Inlet Lighthouse Preservation Association and the longest serving member of its Board of Trustees, Gladys has a far more intimate connection to the Ponce Inlet community than any other Town resident.

Born and raised near Savannah, Georgia, Earl Davis moved to the Daytona Beach area shortly after graduating from Stetson University in 1950. He met Gladys shortly thereafter while dining at Chief Meyer's Fishing Camp and Grill where she worked as a waitress. The two hit it off almost immediately and were married in 1955.

Although his work with Florida Power and Light forced the couple to live elsewhere for a time, they maintained a house on Beach Street that had served as the Meyer family's residence years earlier. Located a stone's throw from Light Station where Gladys had been born, the

Davis family raised their two daughters in the home that had originally been built by James Hasty as a rental cottage. The Davis family continued to live in the historic dwelling until 2003, when they sold it to the Town of Ponce Inlet and relocated to new home. They still live within walking distance of the historic light station.

In the early 1960's, when the Town was newly incorporated, there were less than 250 residents. It was said then that, "If you want something done, give it to the women." There was a group of women known as the "go to girls," and Gladys was one. She was part of the group who formed the Ponce Inlet Women's Club in 1966 and served as Treasurer and a Past President. This year is her 48th year as a Member.

In the early 1970's when the Lighthouse was slated for demolition a wonderful group of Ponce Inlet residents stepped up to form what eventually became the Ponce Deleon Inlet Lighthouse Preservation Association. Gladys was one of the founding members who sat at a card table at the entrance of the Lighthouse collecting twenty five cents for visitors to walk the grounds. This year she will celebrate 42 years of volunteer service to this Board. She and her husband have been awarded the Outstanding Volunteer/Trustee from the Florida Trust for Historic Preservation.

Gladys has remained active in her church and has volunteered within the Ponce Inlet commu-

nity in a number of other ways over the years. Guests visiting the Lighthouse on weekends or on nice sunny days may also be greeted by Gladys and Earl as they sit on porch of the keeper's dwelling where she was born more than 85 years ago.

Not to be outdone, Earl has also played an important role within the local community and Preservation Association since retiring from Florida Power and Light in the early 80s. His contributions to the Association's early efforts to preserve and restore the Light Station were invaluable. Although 89 years old and no longer as spry as he once was, Earl remains one of Ponce Inlet's most active volunteers. In addition to contributing hundreds of hours to the Lighthouse every year, Earl also serves as one of the Town's most knowledgeable historians. When they aren't volunteering at the Lighthouse, Earl and Gladys can often be found helping people in need.

Both Gladys and Earl are recipients of this very special award. They are inseparable and the achievements of one would not have been possible without the support from the other.

Spotlight on Bradley Craig, Police Officer ...



The Ponce Inlet Police Department takes great pleasure in introducing to you our newest full time Police Officer Bradley

Craig. Officer Craig is a 14 year veteran police officer who brings a wealth of knowledge and training to our town. Officer Craig is originally from Indiana, where he began his career in 2000 with the Washington Township School Police in Indianapolis. He moved on to the Indianapolis Metro Police Department where he was assigned as an officer dealing with environmental crimes (including pollution, illegal dumping, protection of endangered species, etc.). He distinguished himself well in his position and eventually moved on to the Indiana State Police, where he was assigned to the Governor's Protection Detail. Officer Craig moved to Florida in 2011 where he worked for the Pensacola Police Department. In addition, Officer Craig worked for the Indiana School for the Deaf and the Florida School for the Deaf and Blind as a Police Officer. Officer Craig comes to Ponce Inlet with numerous certifications including Police Forensics, DNA, and Interviewing Techniques to mention a few. One of his most impressive certifications is as a Drug Recognition Expert. A Drug Recognition Expert (known as a DRE) is a police officer who is explicitly trained in identification of people driving while impaired by drugs. DRE's often testify in court where the term "expert" has important legal implica-

tions. Currently there are about 300 certified DRE's in the State of Florida. Officer Craig sought to work here in Ponce Inlet because he remembered it as a town he visited often when growing up and grew to love. He currently lives in Bunnell with his wife Gina and his two sons Cole 11 and Caden 8. Their whole family is avid salt water fishermen and enjoy coming to Ponce Inlet to enjoy a day of fishing. If you see Brad around town, please extend a Ponce Inlet welcome to him.

Make sure your information is up-to-date in our **CodeRED® Emergency Notification System**. The system will distribute emergency messages via telephone to targeted areas or the entire Town at a rate of 1,000 calls per minute. CodeRED® employs a one-of-a-kind Internet mapping capability for geographic targeting of calls, coupled with a high speed telephone calling system capable of delivering customized pre-recorded emergency messages directly to homes and businesses, live individuals and answering machines.

Ponce Inlet residents and businesses are welcome and encouraged to enter their contact information for home, business, and mobile phones so they may be contacted by the system in the

event of an emergency. It is important for town residents and businesses customers to register, especially if they use unlisted numbers, cell phones, or VOIP. Those who do not register their address and phone number may not be notified with CodeRED® in the case of an emergency. Registration is confidential, free, and easy.

bicycles unattended, even for a short time.



This includes placing barriers completely around your pool to prevent access, using door and pool alarms, closely supervising children, and being prepared in case of an emergency.

Rules of the Road: When jogging with others on the roadway, run in single file. Utilize sidewalks where available and practical. *Always jog facing traffic.* Use extreme caution when crossing streets and intersections.

If children are home alone and are allowed to answer the phone, they should never tell the caller that they are home alone. Make sure your child has a list of phone numbers (neighbors, friends, family) that they can call if they should become frightened *or in the event of an emergency. Ensure that they know how and why to call 911* and when it is appropriate to do so.

Also establish a schedule for your child to check in with mom, dad or their guardian.



Teach your children that it is best to be in a group of friends when going places. When using public restrooms, go as a group. There is safety in numbers.

It's Summertime

With Memorial Day over and school out for summer, safety is something both children and adults should pay close attention to, especially with increased traffic throughout town.

Home and property safety is another thing residents should pay close attention to during the summer months. In addition to thefts from unlocked vehicles, those getting around town on bicycles need to invest in some security. It's recommended that bicyclists have bike locks and use them whenever leaving their

The Ponce Inlet Police Department has a bicycle registration program. The program is free of charge and will assist the Police Department in the event your bicycle is lost or stolen. Anyone wishing to have their bicycle registered may bring it to the Ponce Inlet Police Department between the hours of 9am and 4pm any day of the week.

Summertime Safety Tips

One of the best ways to stay safe this summer is to wear a helmet and other safety gear when biking, skateboarding, and inline skating. Studies on bicycle helmets have shown they can reduce the risk of head inju-




ry by as much as 85 percent. Use layers of protection to prevent a swimming pool tragedy.

strangers watching children and report any suspicious persons or activity to the police immediately.

Summer Weather: Pets in Vehicles



The Ponce Inlet Police Department urges people to *simply leave your pets at home* when you are going on trips that would require your pets to be left in vehicles unattended. Pets are especially susceptible to heat, as they are much less efficient at cooling themselves than people are.

Most people do not realize how quickly the temperature within a vehicle can rise. Researchers found that with outside temperatures as low as 72 degrees, a car's interior can heat up by an average of 40 degrees within an hour, with 80 percent of that increase within the first 30 minutes. **A cracked window provides little relief from the oven effect.**

In the case of a heat-related pet emergency, you should be aware of the following symptoms that could be due to heat stress: heavy panting, glazed eyes, a rapid heartbeat, lethargy, dizziness, lack of coordination, profuse salivation, vomiting, a deep red or purple tongue, and unconsciousness.

If the animal shows symptoms of heatstroke, gradually take steps to lower their body temperature by moving the animal into the shade or an air-conditioned area, applying ice packs to their head, neck, or chest, or immerse them in cool (not cold) water. Let the pet drink small amounts of water or lick ice cubes, and get it to a vet immediately.

Crosswalk Safety

Florida law requires drivers to STOP when a person is attempting to cross the street at a marked pedestrian crosswalk. Unfortunately, many Florida

drivers and almost all tourists are unaware of this law.

This law is intended to have drivers stop when a person is entering the pedestrian crosswalk. If the crosswalk is clear of pedestrians, then you are not required to stop.

At Crosswalks:



Drivers must yield right-of-way to pedestrians where a sign indicates.

If a pedestrian is on half of the roadway and no traffic lights are present, the driver must yield, slow down or stop to give right-of-way to the pedestrian.

Pedestrians may not suddenly leave a curb or other place of safety to walk or run into the path of a vehicle.

If a vehicle has stopped at a crosswalk to allow a pedestrian to cross the roadway, a vehicle behind the stopped vehicle cannot pass the stopped vehicle.

Pedestrians cannot cross an intersection diagonally except if there is a crossing authorized by traffic control devices.

Vacation House Watch:

Please remember that if you are going out of town for the summer, we recommend that you fill out a “**Vacation House Watch Form.**” These forms are available online or in the lobby of the Ponce Inlet Police Department.



During the time you are away, we will make checks on your residence. Remember an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure.

Tips before you go:

Stop mail and newspaper delivery or have someone collect them from your mailbox and yard.

Use light timers so it appears that someone is home at night.

Unplug your automatic garage door.

Lock all doors and windows. If vehicles are left behind, do not leave valuables in plain sight.

Have your lawn and yard maintained so it does not look as though you are away.

Pick It or Ticket



“A Law You Can Live With”
The most responsible thing pet owners can do for their families, community, and environment is to make sure their pets are picked up after. *Per Section 10-36 of the town’s ordinance, you are required to clean up after your animal or you could be ticketed for \$103.00.* We have received complaints at the Police Department that some individuals are not abiding by this code. Be a good neighbor and pick up after your animal.

We Can Keep Our Children Safe by Preventing Drowning

Ponce Inlet is determined to reduce the number of child deaths in our area and prevent situations from happening to others. Sadly, Florida loses more children under the age of five to drowning than any other state. Last year in our four-county area, there were 20 child deaths. Several of these were by drowning. Most of those deaths were preventable. Here are tips to make sure that this does not happen to you and your loved ones:

- Keep your eyes on the kids!!! Never leave a child unsupervised around any water including pools, spas, bathtubs, buckets, beaches or ponds. It can only take a few moments for a tragedy to happen. When children are swimming, parents should make sure that at least one adult is actively watching a child and not distracted by cell phones or conversations.
- Parents and pool owners can also help prevent child deaths by

using barriers, pool access door alarms and locks on pools to prevent young children from slipping out of the house and into a body of water.

- Teach children how to tread water, how to float and how to swim.
- Do not leave toys that will interest little children around the pool.



We are blessed to live in a community with great weather and wonderful water recreation opportunities. Working together, we can help keep our children safe in these environments.

From the Fire Marshal




Now that the summer heat is upon us, it's important to re-

member that vegetation and brush start dry out and become fire hazards. Often times, the dried out vegetation and brush are located very close to structures and create an undue risk of a house fire.

Firewise is a program that recommends fire safety tips to limit the fire hazards caused by the summer heat. The primary goal for Firewise landscaping is fuel reduction — limiting the amount of flammable vegetation and materials surrounding the home and increasing the mois-

safety measure. Keeping roofs and gutters clean and clear of leaves or needles is critical to minimizing ignition from embers. Flammable attachments (e.g., untreated wooden decks) are very vulnerable to ignition and can carry fire to the main structure. Keep flat surfaces clear of debris. Clean out any leaves, needles or stored material that could burn from under decks or porches. During this high fire danger season, remove large potential heat sources such as piles of firewood, spare building materials, vehicles -



ture content of remaining vegetation.

NFPA advises property owners to start with the house and work their way out. Having a non-flammable roof covering and assembly adds an enormous

anything that could catch embers or ignite by flames in the grass needs to be as far away from dwellings as possible.

Remove fuel sources close to the house: The perimeter of the home and attachments out to about 5 feet is vulnerable if

there is anything there - organic mulch, woody shrubs and plants, juniper bushes - that could ignite and thus allow flames to touch the house. Wind-driven fire will create a blizzard of embers that will pile up in corners where you might normally find accumulations of leaves or needles around your home. These corners, nooks and crannies should be clear of any flammables. If there are any limbs or branches overhanging the roof, or any branches close to/touching the house, trim back to at least 10 feet from the house. Keep grass mowed low and well watered if possible.

In the event of a fire, remember that **every second counts**, so you and your family must always be prepared. Escape plans help you get out of your home quickly. In less than 30 seconds, a small flame can get completely out of control and turn into a major fire. It only takes minutes for a house to fill with thick black smoke and become engulfed in flames.

Prepare and practice your fire escape plan twice a year with everyone in your household, including children and people with disabilities. It's also a good idea to practice your plan with overnight guests. Some tips to consider when preparing your escape plan include:

- Draw a map of each level of your home and show all doors

and windows. Find two ways to get out of each room. Make sure all doors and windows that lead outside open easily.

- Only purchase collapsible escape ladders evaluated by a recognized testing laboratory. Use the ladder only in a real emergency.

- Teach children how to escape on their own in case you cannot help them.

- Have a plan for everyone in your home who has a disability.

Practice your fire escape plan at night and during the daytime.

Updates to the Land Use & Development Code (LUDC)

The Town’s effort to update the LUDC continues in 2014. In July, the Town Council is preparing to adopt revisions to the Landscap-

ing and Tree Preservation section of the code. These updates are the product of 15 public workshops and meetings with the Park Board, Planning Board, and Town Council since January 2013.

The Council has already adopted a new plant list, which contains a variety of salt- and drought-tolerant species that thrive in the coastal climate. The ordinance and new plant list are intended to make the regulations easier to understand and provide greater flexibility to meet their intended purpose.

The Town Council is also considering an ordinance allowing medical marijuana dispensaries as a special exception use in certain locations. Special exception uses are those which *may* be allowed in limited circumstances under certain conditions, and which first require review by the Planning Board and approval by the Town Council, rather than being allowed by right. The proposed ordinance would prohibit such facilities if located within 2,500 feet of any pre-existing school, house of worship, day care facility, public park, public beach, or another medical marijuana dispensary. Second reading of this ordinance is scheduled for July 2014.

The Planning Board is continuing to hold workshops on additional LUDC amendment topics, including:

Among the other goals is museum programming; please look for our future projects that include new items in the collection, outreach programs, educational programming geared toward children, exhibits, and events that incorporate Ponce Inlet's past. Trash bags left at the curb invite animal intrusion, can leak contaminants into the soil and storm water systems, and can be a very unpleasant hazard for pedestrians and vehicles during bad weather and winds.

Although trash cans can be inconvenient, the use of approved trash containers is both necessary and required by law.

Sections 62-7, 62-33, & 62-45 of the Town's Code of Ordinances states: "It shall be the duty of the

person responsible for each account to supply required trash cans".



The Town Code requires that trash receptacles have a capacity of 10 to 40 gallons and be constructed of metal or plastic and free from holes or leaks. To prevent entrance of rainwater, wild animals and insects, containers must have appropriate fitted metal or plastic cover.

The trash receptacles and containers must be placed at the point of pick up no earlier than 6:00 pm on the evening preceding the regular scheduled pick up day. These trash containers must be removed from the pickup points by 7:00 pm on the afternoon of pickup.

Trash pickup days are Monday and Thursday of each week.

So the next time you take out the trash, please make sure it's in an **approved container**. Thank you!

Archived permits are now available on line. All permits issued for single-family properties have been scanned and are now availa-

ble on our website. These permits were formerly referred to as the "street address files". Multi-family and commercial properties are being processed and will be available on-line later this year. To view permits, visit the Building Division of the Town's website, and look for the link titled "Archived Permits".

If you have a permitting question, wish to report a violation, or suspect a violation, please call 386-236-2182 or visit our website to file an on-line complaint.

Beware of Unlicensed Contractors! Unlicensed contracting has always been a problem in Florida. During these slow economic times many people portray themselves as being licensed and insured when in fact they are not. Before signing a contract or giving a deposit for proposed work check with the Ponce Inlet Building Department for verification that they are properly licensed.

Water Meter Access: Please keep your water meters clear of vegetation, vehicles, and other obstacles as this hinders meter readings and repairs. Ready access to your meter is a **must**. **Meters that need to be re-read due to blocked access are subject to additional fees.**

Solid Waste, Yard Waste & Recycling: Household trash (solid waste), Yard Waste, and Recycling services are provided by Waste Management. If you have questions, they can be reached at 673-0800, x-331 during normal business hours. Please keep in mind that large piles or special pick-ups may be assessed additional fees. The regular schedule for pickups in the Town is: **Monday** and **Thursday** house hold trash, **Tuesday** recycling and yard trash, and **Wednesday** large piles of yard trash. Please make sure all items are to the curb before 7 am on the day of pick up.

Residential Yard Waste: When you remove weed trees, bushes, plants, dead trees and limbs,

or clear excessive vegetation, **please make sure you place all vegetation debris curbside, on “your” property.** Please do not place residential yard




waste on any empty lot as Waste Management does not assess *vacant lots*, therefore they *do* not receive collection service and the debris will not be picked up.

If you have a large amount of debris please call **Waste Management at : 386-615-7783** to request a specific pickup at your property, (there is no extra charge for this residential service). If you have a contractor removing and clearing your yard debris, it is their responsi-



bility to remove the debris and it should not be placed curbside.

Storm Water Maintenance:



Please do not dispose of swimming pool water and debris into the City's storm drain system. To reduce pollutants into our storm drains, proper treatment and maintenance of pool water and debris, including occasional backwashing or partial draining is very important.

A pool owner may be tempted to discharge pool water into the street and gutter that leads to a storm drain. However, the purpose of the storm drain system is to protect against flooding and water damage by quickly removing rain water from our streets. This water gets no treatment.

Unfortunately, pool water discharges can contain environmentally harmful pollutants such as excess salts, elevated chlorine and other chemicals, and even nuisances such as mosquito larvae.

Drain your pool or spa water on to your landscape, lawn or

rocky areas on your property and allow the water to percolate into the ground. Be sure to use caution when applying pool water on certain plants since it contains more salt and chlorine than tap water.

Never drain pool water into or toward a sanitary sewer manhole installed in the street.

Annual Shock Treatment of the Water Distribution System:

During July & August water plant personnel change the disinfectant that is used in the treatment process. Fire hydrants are flushed throughout the entire water distribution system to improve water quality and increase the bacteriological integrity of the water distribution system.

Water Fact: Most weight-loss programs call for drinking a healthy amount of water every day to help process food and counter act hunger attacks. We often feel hungry when we are dehydrated. Drinking a glass of water can alleviate hunger pangs.





cats in Ponce Inlet through a trap-neuter-return (TNR) program. TNR is a proven alternative to trap and kill animal control.

We have TNR cats in several different locations in town that are fed by registered caregivers. If you believe a stray cat is in need of care, please contact PAW for help with trapping and neutering at (386) 316-2991.

If you are feeding stray cats, your kindness is incomplete without ensuring that they are spayed or neutered to prevent unwanted animals and suffering. Well-fed, un-fixed cats can produce many offspring very quickly.

For our April 19th celebration of Florida Lighthouse Day, John Mann, our lead lighthouse VIP volunteer and avid pharologist, presented a special program on *Lighthouses of Florida*.
